**LANCASTER MEDICAL RESERVE CORPS PROMOTES
RESPIRATORY HEALTH AT “LOVE YOUR LUNGS” EVENT**

September 25, 2003 – (Lancaster, PA) – Volunteers from the Lancaster Medical Reserve Corps will participate in Saturday’s “Love Your Lungs” event at J.P. McCaskey High School. The event, which take place from 9 a.m. – 2 p.m. at Victory Field, is designed to promote a broader community awareness of respiratory health and environmental impacts on breathing. Free respiratory health screenings will be offered to students of the School District of Lancaster School, staff, parents, neighbors, and first responders, such as police officers and firefighters.

“My experience with volunteer and public safety personnel at Ground Zero demonstrates the importance of creating a baseline screening of respiratory health for first responders and members of the community. In the case of a disaster, it is helpful to know the current state of an individual’s respiratory health, so that they can be monitored for changes that may result from exposure at a disaster scene,” says Dr. Robert Gillio, Chief Medical Officer of the Lancaster Medical Reserve Corps and co-founder of InnerLink, a Lancaster-based technology company.

InnerLink, Lancaster General and Millersville University will provide up to 100 respiratory health screenings in conjunction with the Lancaster Medical Reserve Corps (LMRC). Information from the screening will be given to each participant on paper. After the event, first responders will be given the option to have a TEAM[®] Health Record established in their name. This electronic medical record is available 24/7 via a secure web portal, known as the TEAM[®] System.

About the Lancaster Medical Reserve Corps

The Lancaster Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) was formed in November 2002 as an initiative of the Lancaster Citizen Corps Council, under the leadership of Dr. James Argires, a Lancaster neurosurgeon. The Lancaster MRC is the first in Pennsylvania to have been funded by the US Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Surgeon General. The Lancaster MRC is one of a growing number of voluntary organizations established as part of the USA Freedom Corps initiative, whose aim is to mobilize citizens to improve the health and safety of their communities. MRC units provide practicing and retired physicians, nurses and other health professionals as well as other citizens interested in health issues, with an organized mechanism through which they can volunteer their time and skills to strengthen their communities by preparing for and responding to large-scale emergencies, such as an influenza epidemic, chemical spill, or act of terrorism. In addition, MRC unit volunteers work to improve the overall health and well being of their communities by engaging in appropriate public health initiatives throughout the year.
